
English 10: Unit 2 Overview/Assessment Plan Things Fall Apart by Chinua Achebe September - October 2016

Research Project- Due 9/12

Instructions: Your assignment is to select one of the following research questions related to *Things Fall Apart and* create a poster that teaches your peers about the topic.

Research Questions

- 1) Who was Chinua Achebe and why did he write *Things Fall Apart?*
- 2) Who are the Ibo people? What are some unique aspects to their cultural groups? How does this relate to *Things Fall Apart?*
- 3) How did Colonization affect Nigeria? How does colonization relate to *Things Fall Apart*?
- 4) What role did missionaries play in Nigeria? How does this relate to *Things Fall Apart*?

Research Requirements

- 1. Must Complete a dialectical research journal
- 2. Must use authentic, reliable sources
- 3. Must use at least 1 of Ms. Tesch's printed sources
- 4. Must create an MLA formatted work cited documented to accompany poster, must be printed or emailed by research date.

Poster Requirements

- 1. Clearly includes title of subject
- 2. Explains what the topic is
- 3. Explains **how** the topic is related to *Things Fall Apart*
- 4. Provides important dates, facts, names
- 5. Asks a question
- 6. Includes an image and a map
- 7. Is nicely written and creative

Literary Analysis Essay - Due 10/14

Instructions: Your assignment is to write a 3 page essay where you analyze *Things Fall Apart* and examine a character's response to the cultural collision caused by the introduction of Western ideas into Ibo culture. In your essay, analyze how the collision challenges the character's sense of identity and explain how his or her response shapes the meaning of the work as a whole.

Before-Writing-the-essay-Process (Reading)

- 1) As you read the novel, take detailed notes on important characters
- 2) Takes notes on how the characters response to Western Ideas. Take note of important page numbers and quotes.
- 3) Use annotation techniques and reading strategies to increase your knowledge of the text
- 4) Ask questions about parts you don't understand

Pre-Writing Process

- 1) Review the prompt
- 2) Review the Rubric
- 3) Gather your notes and create an outline
- 4) Draft your thesis and get feedback on your thesis before you write the essay.
- 5) Find evidence to support your thesis before you begin writing.

Drafting/Revising

- 1) Draft essay and get feedback
- 2) Type essay in MLA format and create bibliography
- 3) Turn in on time
